Blessing of Throats

Saint Blaise was the bishop of Sebaste (now Sivas, Turkey). The first known record of the saint's life comes from medical writings where he is recorded as helping patients suffering from objects stuck in their throat. He is depicted holding two crossed candles in his hand. He is also shown with steel combs. The similarity of the steel combs and the wool combs made a large contribution to Saint Blaise's as the patron saint of wool combers and the wool trade.

A doctor and then later a "physician of souls", later in life he lived in a cave with wild animals. He died a martyr in the year 316.

Many Catholics have their throats blessed on his feast day on (or near) February 3rd. Anyone of any faith can come forward to receive this blessing on: Friday the 2nd: after the St Michael 8:30am Mass. Saturday the 3rd: after the St Francis 5pm Vigil Mass.

From Our Deacon:

I'd like to start out my first bulletin article with a huge thank you to everyone in both parishes for the warm and enthusiastic welcome Lisa and I have received. We both feel overwhelmed with gratitude for your kindness. I only hope that our service to St. Michael's and St. Francis's parishes will be worthy of the tremendous support we've received.

While my office is at St. Francis, I will work hard to serve the needs of both St. Francis and St. Michael's parishes, as well as to be involved with Muskegon Catholic Central. I can be reached at (231) 755-1953 x225 or by email at deacon@stfrancisns.org. I will not be in every weekday, so if you have an urgent need, the office managers of both parishes are able to reach me at any time.

I've been asked several times over the past couple weeks, "So just what does a deacon do?" So here's a brief overview. What a deacon isn't is a mini-priest. Ordination to the deaconate is a separate ordination than to the priesthood (though all priests were first ordained deacons, and therefore are *also* deacons). The diaconate is a whole different animal, so to speak, with different charisms and responsibilities. Deacons' roles vary based on the unique talents, skills and experiences of the individuals, but usually deacons are focused on both the Word of God (i.e. preaching, teaching, the Gospel, etc.) and on service (including leadership as well as "getting dirty") to the Church community. A deacon is a good person to reach out to for any need, whether it be spiritual, physical, formation, or other.

Sacramentally speaking, a deacon IS ordained clergy, and is therefore authorized (both by the Church and legally) to do the same sort of work that a protestant minister might do. For example, deacons often preside at weddings, baptisms and funerals, especially if they do not take place as part of a full mass. The reason deacons don't usually preside at those sacraments when they are part of a mass, is because only a priest or bishop may preside at a full mass (i.e. including the consecration), and since there is already one there, it makes sense that the priest would also preside for the wedding/baptism/funeral as well. That said, in the unforeseen absence of a priest, a deacon may lead a communion service *in place of* the mass. The biggest difference is that the communion service will not include the consecration of the eucharist, since that can only be done by a priest or bishop. In a communion service, consecrated hosts are brought in from a different mass, so that the parish can still receive communion. Hopefully this won't happen often, because a full mass is always a better option when possible.

A deacon cannot give Last Rites or hear confessions. I guess it's not so much that I can't hear confessions, but that I cannot give absolution (and also that I don't want to hear confessions). Here's an interesting thing. While the priest (in our case Father Steve) is the pastor of our parishes, and therefore the <u>final authority in all things</u> for the parishes, the deacon actually works directly for and under the authority of the bishop in the same way the priest does. When I met with Bishop Walkoviak and was assigned to these parishes, he gave me some direction for my role here. Among other things, he has asked that I focus my service on marriage prep and the sacrament of marriage, the Cursillo movement, preaching, giving spiritual direction and guidance, and to involve myself with the Catholic Schools and faith formation. Needless to say, that's a lot to take on, so I plan on working into those roles very gradually and in a limited fashion. In other words, I have no intention of replacing anyone, but every intention of providing support to the wonderful lay leaders we already have in both parishes.

While deacon wives are much less formal in their service (and not ordained), they often find themselves in pretty high demand as well. Lisa and I have discussed this, and she is prepared to provide support as she is available as well, though I think Lisa tends to be more comfortable as a "behind the scenes" support person rather than taking on big leadership roles.

I hope this helps to answer the questions about what my role will be in the parishes. But I would love to add one more thought. We need more deacons, especially along the lakeshore. Now that Bishop Walkoviak has opened up the diaconate formation program again, married couples with grown or mostly grown children, who are interested in considering "next level" service to the church are encouraged to come and see me to find out more about it. The 4-5 year formation process is a bit grueling, and not all candidates end up as deacons. For those who do, diaconate service is an unpaid position, but the retirement plan is *out of this world*.

Thank you all again for your warm welcome. Please continue to pray for me as I continue to pray for you.


