I Owe You An Apology - Gaudete Sunday by Deacon Jim Cross Advent Traditions

Our Advent and Christmas seasons are distinguished by many colorful traditions whose histories go way back in the history of the Catholic Church. Occasionally we are called on to defend or explain those traditions to non-Catholics who can see them as frivolous or at times even apostasy. Here's some brief info that might help explain a few of our traditions:

The Advent wreath is a tradition that goes back to early medieval times. It is more likely that the wreath came as an adaptation from the Christmas tree (below) than from its same source. Nevertheless, the circular advent wreath is full of symbolism of God's never ending and "ever-green" love and Jesus as the light of the world. The purple color of Advent calls us to conversion and preparation for the coming of the Lord. The first purple candle, the prophet's candle, represents our HOPE, the coming of the Savior. The second purple candle, the Bethlehem candle, represents PEACE. The third, shepherd's, candle represents our JOYFUL and imminent expectation, which is the reason for the lighter, rose hue. The final purple candle, the angel's candle, represents the PEACE that our triumphant Savior will bring.

Gaudete Sunday is the celebration of the halfway point of our period of preparation. The deeper purple liturgical colors are temporarily lightened to an uplifting "rose" hue (not pink) in order to represent the uplifting of our spirits as Christ draws near. And that's the key to Gaudete (Latin for Rejoice) Sunday. We are moving from "Christ is coming" to "Christ is near." This tradition dates back to roughly the fourth century. For comparison purposes, that's roughly as far back as the official Cannon of the Bible.

"O" Antiphons are the ancient verses we chant (usually as part of evening prayers) during the last 7 days before the Christmas Vigil. They may be more familiar to most of us as (roughly) the verses of the Christmas carol "O Come, O Come Emmanuel." The "O" Antiphons represent our longing for the coming of Christ, and have been sung by the Church since at least the eighth century. They are a magnificent theology that uses ancient biblical imagery drawn from the messianic hopes of the Old Testament to proclaim the coming of Christ as the fulfillment not only of Old Testament hopes, but of present ones as well. Their repeated use of the imperative "O Come!" embodies the longing of all for the Divine Messiah. If there is one present day Christmas carol that best represents Advent, O Come, O Come Emmanuel is probably it.

The Creche, or Nativity Scene, dates back to the early 1200s, when St. Francis of Assisi invented it as a way of celebrating the coming of Christ at Christmas. His hope was to provide the poor of the communities an experience not unlike a pilgrimage to the birthplace of Christ. His first nativity scene used live people and animals from the village. The name Creche, comes from the Latin word for crib.

The Christmas Tree - We sometimes take some "heat " for the fact that the Christmas tree is adapted from earlier Pagan traditions, but really we should hold that as a point of pride. That's the point of evangelism. That's what Christianity did, as it spread throughout the pagan world. It took the lives and traditions of an unchristian world and transformed them, making them holy. That's what Christ did, and through us, it's what He still does even to this day.

(Ps 27:14). May the power of hope fill our days, as we await with confidence the coming of the Lord Jesus Christ, to whom be praise and glory, now and forever." Rejoice! The Lord is near!
